#### CREOSOTE BUSH – As Seen in The Today's News - Herald

#### That distinct desert smell!

We finally got a little rain here recently (not enough but anything helps in this dry time). How did my mom know when she opened the door and could smell the creosote? "I love that fresh rain smell," she said. Indeed, there's a distinctive scent in the desert right after a rain thanks to the creosote bush (larrea tridentata), also known as greasewood. Some don't like the smell, but many of us do. Love it or hate it, it's one of the most iconic "smells" of the desert.

The creosote is so common here it's easy to take it for granted. However, it's quite a fascinating plant and is among the oldest living organisms on the planet! At least, if you include its cloning ability. Individual creosote can live 100 years or more before its crown splits and the central branches die. Smaller clones of the same plant grown up from seed from these old plants, eventually forming a ring of cloned plants that can continue in the same spot for hundreds or even thousands of years. As time goes on, the circle of new plants widens, and these "rings" can grow to several meters in width. Scientists differ on just how old these plant rings can get, but there is one creosote ring named the "King Clone" that lives in the Mojave Desert of California that is estimated to be up to 11,700 years old! So how does the creosote survive so long in some of the most extreme environments on Earth? It's got several useful survival strategies. It needs very little water and is the most drought-tolerant perennial plant in North America.

Twiggy, light gray stems grow tiny, almost waxy leaves. This waxy coating and small leaf size helps prevent moisture loss. The plant can also drop its leaves to some extent during hot conditions.

Their roots are so effective at taking in moisture they leave little for any other plants germinating next to them. Creosotes have chemicals in their roots and leaves which discourage growth of most other plants next to them, reducing competition for water and nutrients. These chemicals also discourage most herbivores from browsing on them. However, despite this toxicity, creosote plants also provide many benefits to the desert ecosystem.

Creosote bushes are messy, dropping leaves and twigs that create a nutrient layer in the soil around them. Young cacti often grow at the edges under their light shade, receiving protection from the sun until they are old enough to withstand the heat on their own, earning the creosote the nickname of "nurse plant." Many burrowing creatures dig tunnels among the creosotes' deep roots. While few animals eat the leaves, many feast on the flowers and seeds the creosote produces. Kangaroo rats, pocket mice, and desert iguanas are among these animals.

Creosote has a chemical compound, nordihydroguaiaretic acid, which is also being looked at as a possible cancer treatment. There's a long history of creosotes' use in Native American medicinal treatments. However, there is also evidence that creosote, especially when it is processed and used as a "coal tar" wood preservative, may potentially cause cancer in humans. The FDA recommends NOT ingesting creosote at all.

Interestingly, when Lieutenant Edward Beale brought his camel riding expedition through Mohave County starting in 1857, he found that the camels readily ate creosote.

Camels originally evolved in North America but went extinct here about 11,000 years ago, around the time "King Clone" was just getting started. Camels brought to North America in more recent times readily adapted to their ancient food.

#### - HAVASU 4 WHEELERS TRAIL RATINGS -- Mandatory Vehicle Equipment - All vehicles on H4W runs must be 4-wheel drive & equipped with a CB radio, fire extinguisher, first aid kit, tow straps, and front and rear tow hooks or safe hitching point ..... all in working order. RATING **DESCRIPTION** 1 EASIEST: Passable by stock vehicles. Gentle fairly wide grades. EASY: Use of 2 wheel and some 4-wheel drive. Trail may have some rocks, loose road surface, and ruts but a reasonable line for driving. 2 3 EASIEST MODERATE: 4-wheel drive with aggressive tire treads. Expect a rough road with rocks and sand that requires lower tire pressure. Substantial sections of single lane. 31/4 MODERATE: Some 4 wheel driving experience needed. Same as above with some use of high and low range gearing. These trails have a rough, rutted surface, rocks and deep sand. Sections may be steep enough to cause traction problems, narrow shelf roads with steep drop -offs and tight clearance between rocks. 31/2 HARDER MODERATE: For experienced drivers. At least a 2" lift and 33' tires with aggressive tire tread, one locked differential, high and low range gearing. Potentially dangerous, large rocks, ruts, steep slopes, loose surface and narrow clearances that need to be negotiated. 33/4 HARDEST MODERATE: Skilled experienced drivers only. Same as above with both differentials locked, some strapping/winching. Very challenging sections, extremely steep grades, loose surfaces, large rocks, deep ruts and tight clearances. DIFFICULT: Highly skilled experienced drivers only. Same as above with belly up, 4 to 1 transfer case or equivalent, skid plates, beefed up 4 axles and suspension system. Probable strapping/winching. Vehicle width and wheelbase should be considered. Possible body damage. HARD: All of the above. Probable body damage.
